FIRST SUNDAY **OF I FNT**

WE CAN GET OVERLY FOCUSED ON INDIVIDUAL SIN AND PERSONAL SALVATION DURING LENT. Yet one of

the biggest lessons learned from last year's Lent is that our wellbeing is intimately tied to the well-being of others. Healing must be a communal effort. Slowly we began to understand that when one member of the body suffers, all suffer with it.

The effects of our individual transgressions are often magnified by systemic corruption that brings harm to others we may not even know. In the same way, every personal choice to not only turn away from sin but also work for the good influences and strengthens the entire body. God's grace that enables us to bring healing can go viral if we share it by our own

In today's readings, God makes a covenant of salvation not with one person or one family but with an entire race and beyond, with all of creation—a covenant between God and the earth. Though we may sin by our individual acts, we are not alone in our struggle against evil. Even Jesus was not alone as he faced his own temptations. God saves a people so that each member of the body may find strength in the other and rejoice in the salvation of all.

SECOND SUNDAY FEBRUARY 28

THE TRANSFIGURATION SCENE MIDWAY THROUGH

MARK'S GOSPEL is the climactic crossroads where we must choose between staying in Galilee or going with Jesus to death in Jerusalem. In the previous chapter, Peter recognized Jesus's true mission as Messiah and was quickly reprimanded for thinking that being the Messiah or his disciple saved a person from suffering. Jesus makes it clear. The only way to follow him is through the cross. The only way to save your life is to lose it.

The Transfiguration gives us a glimpse of that eternal life to come. So wouldn't it be nice to just put up a few tents and stay a while to enjoy the view on God's holy mountain? We know the answer. "There is no salvation for the soul nor hope for eternal life except in the cross," wrote spiritual writer Thomas à Kempis in the 15th century. There is no Transfiguration without the cross; no conversion of heart until you have given up the

very thing you cling to-privilege, status, belief in your own rightness. For the cross is that to which you say, I will give you anything but that, Lord. Anything.

Let us come down the mountain and do the hard work of taking up our cross. Transfiguration awaits those who let go of the very thing they cannot lose.

MARCH 7 THIRD SUNDAY OF LENT

THE TEMPLE CLEANSING IS FOUND IN ALL FOUR GOSPELS. However, John puts this scene right after Jesus's miracle at Cana at the start of his ministry. In the synoptics, it takes place at the end and is a catalyst for Jesus's arrest.

The marketplace system at the temple wasn't anything new to Jews. Buying and selling animals was a necessary activity for pilgrims who wanted to offer sacrifice. Furthermore, not only moneychangers but also the Roman government benefitted from this system. So why would Jesus, at the beginning of his ministry, show such rage against this everyday practice sanctioned by both church and state?

John's placement is both a Christological statement and a challenge to Christ's would-be followers. Do you believe in Jesus because of the miracles and signs? Or do you believe in what the signs point to—the world-turned-upside-down reign

of God embodied in Jesus himself? In today's society, built upon systemic injustice, the question for Christians may be this: Do you worship human structures and systems that benefit the powerful few at the expense of the marginalized, even if they are long-held religious practices? Or do you worship Christ, who is the temple for every age? Can we turn over the tables of our own systems of injustice even if it means disrupting our everyday lives?

FOURTH SUNDAY **OF ADVENT**

FROM THE BEGINNING OF THIS LENTEN CYCLE OF **READINGS**, we have heard a consistent message: faith in Jesus will convict us. Set against the Gospels we have heard this Lent, faith can no longer be approached as an individual endeavor, practiced without sacrifice, reduced to following the law, or domesticated into a slogan—John 3:16. That often-cited, comforting verse must be read in the stark light of verse 19: "And this is the verdict, that the light came into the world, but people preferred darkness to light, because their works were

God's gratuitous gift of the Son cannot be passively received without the return gift of a life convicted to the Light and everything that the Light came to dispel. Thus, one cannot profess faith in Christ without taking a stand for justice, without siding with the powerless, without putting one's reputation and

evil."

life on the line for those who live under the constant threat of death. For faith is not a neutral act. To receive the gift of Light in Christ without acting as people of light is to pollute the Lord's temple. It is, as the psalmist sings, to forget the Lord. Therefore, let our tongues be silenced, our harps put away, and our lands laid waste until we remember the demands of faith in Christ.

1ARCH 21 FIFTH SUNDAY

"WE WOULD LIKE TO SEE JESUS." That is the opening request given to the disciples in today's Gospel by those from the outside of Jesus's circle of followers. Throughout John's Gospel, to see and hear Jesus is to know Jesus and to know the Father. By extension, to see and hear Jesus's followers is to encounter Jesus himself, for, as the Gospel says, where Jesus is, there will his servants be. We see this intimate unity between Jesus and his disciples (meaning us) foreshadowed in the abundant fruit that his followers will yield if they die to themselves in imitation of Jesus. In Jesus's prayer before his arrest, we will hear again of the intimate unity between Father and Son and, thus, between Son and those who have received the Spirit of love shared by the Father and Son.

ON MY TRAVELS, I often receive requests from concerned parents asking me to pray for one or more of their children who have lost faith. Their sadness is tangible and free of anger or resentment. They simply want their child to come home to Jesus.

As children we are handed our faith, and at some point we must make it our own through our ongoing conversion to Christ. That process is at times painful, leaving scars of doubt. Yet the Risen One's appearance to the disciples, wounds fully on display, proclaims that the resurrected Christ we believe in will always and only be known as Jesus crucified. Resurrection does not erase suffering, expecting us to believe as children do, uncritically. Rather Christ's glorified wounds sanctify ours, including those of our struggles with faith.

For those saddened by a loved one's abandonment of faith,

the work of Scripture scholar Sandra Schneiders, IHM, on this passage may be a comfort. Analyzing the Greek, she understands Christ's words regarding forgiveness to mean that what is retained, or held onto, is not the sin but the person.

Christ, by his own wounds, holds on to those who have lost faith. And we, the body of Christ, by our ongoing care, hold on to them as well. In Christ's body, no one is lost.

THIRD SUNDAY OF EASTER

APRIL 18

TODAY'S GOSPEL PASSAGE ENDS WITH JESUS SAYING TO HIS DISCIPLES (and to us), "You are witnesses of these things." This is not a hope or desire. It's not a premonition or an invitation. It is a statement of fact. You are witnesses.

For people of faith, there is no other choice than to witness to what we have seen and heard and done in Christ Jesus. In baptism, we were reborn this way. We can't hand off this identity to the religious experts. It's not something we promise to be once we're trained enough. You are witnesses, right now, with all your doubts, your faults and failings, and your unique gifts and perspectives. You alone are a witness to Christ in your one-of-akind way.

So the questions are these: What are we witnesses to? And how will we witness that to the world? We are witnesses to the

fact that in Christ, death does not have the last word; hearts can be changed and broken relationships mended; peoples from every nation can become one.

This Easter, look around you and see where these things are happening and stand witness to that. Seek out reconciliation and be witness to that. Find Christ in the stranger and announce who you see in them. For you are witnesses of these things.

APRIL 25 FOURTH SUNDAY

OF EASTER

WHEN WE HEAR JESUS SAY, "I AM THE GOOD **SHEPHERD**," it's tempting to wander off into bucolic bliss. If we do that, we're missing the radical point of this I AM statement.

The startling question underneath it is this: Good for whom? That is, who is Jesus being a good shepherd for? Well, of course, us, the flock of the Lord. But we are not the only ones. Jesus says there are others outside of this flock for whom he must lay down his life until there is one flock and one shepherd. This should convict us to ask: Why aren't they part of the fold? Have we done something to prevent them from wanting to belong or even feeling welcomed? Have we been protective of our pasture, our pew, our privileges to let Jesus be good for those we might not want among us, those we think don't deserve it? Are we hoarding Jesus's goodness for ourselves?

Here's the twist of this Gospel's two-edged sword: Jesus is

not the only good shepherd who must lay down his life. Two weeks from now, we will hear Jesus say that all who want to be his friends must also lay down their lives for their friends—that is, for Jesus's ever-expanding flock. We aren't the sheep here. We're the shepherd.

FIFTH SUNDAY OF EASTER

MAY 2

TODAY WE HEAR JESUS'S LAST I AM STATEMENT IN JOHN'S GOSPEL: "I AM THE TRUE VINE." As with last week's Christological statement, we can fall into the trap of mishearing today's Gospel as a judgment of those who aren't already part of the vine and a comfort for those who are. God's Word will not let us get away that easily.

The emphasis in this reading and throughout John's Gospel is on the unity of the disciples with Jesus and with one another. If we disconnect our love for Christ from our love for the diverse "community of strangers" that is the church, we have cut ourselves off from the Vine. If we branch out on our own, seeing our faith as an individual guarantee of salvation instead of the radical call to solidarity with God's most precious ones—the poor, the marginalized, the ones left to die—then we have severed ourselves from the Gospel of Christ.

Our love for Christ will be measured "not in word or speech but in deed and truth" (second reading). Let us cling to the Vine, recognizing our need for one another, and let the Word of God prune away the diseases of racism, indifference, selfishness, and pride, so that we may bear good fruit and glorify the Father by our lives.

Bird, page 21).

In today's first reading from Acts, no one was more astounded than Peter and his companions when they visited the house of Cornelius, a centurion of the Roman army and a servant to Caesar. Recall that it was the Roman soldiers under the reign of Caesar who beat and crucified Jesus. Surely Peter and his companions walked into the Roman guard's home with some assumptions about who should deserve God's hate. But Acts describes Cornelius as upright, God-fearing, and respected by the whole Jewish nation. He prayed constantly to God and gave alms to support the Jewish people. And upon receiving an angelic vision, he summoned Peter to come to his home and preach the Gospel of Jesus there.

God indeed shows no partiality when it comes to the gift of divine love. But we humans are experts at prejudice and believing we know the mind of God. This is why Jesus's single commandment is to love, plain and simple, for everyone who loves knows God. Love will be the key that opens the doors between enemies and binds them in self-giving love.

TODAY'S GOSPEL PASSAGE WAS NOT MARK'S ORIGINAL

ENDING. That may have been lost, or the evangelist may have indeed intended to end at verse 8 with the disciples fleeing the empty tomb in fear and remaining forever silent. But what kind of "evangelization" is that? So this "longer ending," written by someone other than Mark, has been canonical since the Council of Trent.

We hear Christ's spectacular declaration that his believers will drive out demons, speak new languages, pick up serpents, and drink in poison with no harm as a sign of the power of his name. No one should preach or read this literally. How then do we approach our liturgical task of interpreting the assembly's lives through this text?

As we begin the traditional nine-day vigil toward Pentecost, what demons and serpents in our world need the Spirit's driving wind? We who have been given the Holy Spirit have the power in Jesus's name to dispel the demons of racism, to speak the language of mercy in the foreign land of hatred, to tear away the serpents of gossip and slander that choke human dignity, and to swallow our sinful pride to save ourselves from temptation. So let's stop looking up at the sky and get going to be the signs of God's power over death in the world.

AY 16 SEVENTH SUNDAY OF FASTER

IT'S NOT UNUSUAL TO HEAR SOME VERSION OF

"I come to Mass to get away from the world for one hour." It comes sometimes as homiletic critique: "We shouldn't be hearing about politics or the news at church. I get enough of that at home." Or a warning to kids: "Don't touch that." "Don't go there." "That's only for priests." It's saddest in its most subtle form: "I'm not holy enough for that."

Comments like these protect the holy from human contamination. However, the church long ago condemned gnosticism, which claimed that everything earthly, including our human bodies, was evil. Still, we continue to ignore what both creation and the Incarnation teach us: that the world and all of us in it are good-very good, in fact-good enough for God's Word to dwell within. Ultimately these comments are excuses from doing Christ's mission.

Jesus's prayer today in verses 18 and 19 asserts that we have been consecrated, that is, made holy as Christ is holy. And holy not for safeguarding but for service in and to the world. We are made holy for the purpose of making the world holy. We can't do that by withdrawing from it but only by drawing all that is human, our griefs and joys, our sins and our saintliness, into the sanctifying life of the Trinity.

PENTECOST SUNDAY

MAY 23

LAST YEAR ON PENTECOST, protests broke out in Minneapolis and around the world in response to the torturous eight minute and 46 second recorded murder of George Floyd by a police officer. We all heard the "noise like a strong driving wind" of hard conversations—ones that our Black sisters and brothers have been demanding for 400 years—in our churches, homes, and cities, looking at systemic racism and white privilege. One by one, organizations began tearing down long-standing structures and symbols of injustice against the Black community. And a few weeks later, the same was happening to the systems that harbored sexual abuse and violence against women in the church as reports revealed multiple allegations against a beloved liturgical composer.

Every year, Catholics around the world pray these words in the Pentecost Sequence: "Bend the stubborn heart and will; / Melt the frozen, warm the chill."

The Spirit of Truth will not be silenced by our complicity or cowardice. The Truth the Spirit reveals will not be confined to

dogmas in a catechism but will expose the lies of injustice in all our relationships. For too long, as a church, we thought the Spirit was here to lull us with gentle breezes. We know better now to believe it when we ask the Spirit to come and renew the face of the earth.
